General Rules & Regulations

GENERAL RULES:

Rules subject to change without notice

A FEW RULES WILL APPLY IN ALL CAS-ES AND ENTRIES FOR ANY DEPART-MENT.

Entries should be made as described in each department. All entries should be made directly to the manager of the proper department.

Exhibits must not be removed until date/ time set by each department. Violations of this rule will result in forfeiture of any premiums won.

No exhibitor shall interfere with the work of the judges and in every instance the decision of the judges shall be final.

All exhibits in the hall, having been judged, will be open to the public on Thursday, August 10th.

One person to enter ONE and only ONE exhibit of a kind under a class and item number.

No premiums will be paid other than those listed. No exhibitor will be awarded more than one premium of any kind in any class. This will be enforced.

Any articles previously exhibited are not eligible for premiums or awards in any department.

Where there is no competition, articles will be awarded first or second or no premium, according to their merits.

Any person entering borrowed articles, vegetables or other products and/or making fraudulent representations in reference to an exhibit will forfeit the right to all premiums and passes.

Should any exhibit be of inferior quality or form and in the opinion of the judges unworthy of the premium offered, only such premium will be paid, if any, that meet with the approval of the Fair management.

All agricultural and horticultural products exhibited must have been grown by the exhibitor. Other exhibits must be the exclusive property of the exhibitor. This rule also applies to Grangers and all other groups entering exhibits.

The Skowhegan State Fair Association reserves the right to accept or reject any exhibit and no premium will be paid unless all requirements are fulfilled.

Fifteen entries are required in each exhibition hall to qualify for a season pass. There cannot be a combination between halls.

Complaints by exhibitors of any nature must be submitted in writing to the manager of the department involved not later than twelve o'clock Monday August 12th.

Competent security will be on the grounds 24 hours per day during the fair dates. The Skowhegan State Fair will not be responsible for any loss or damage.

Every possible care will be taken to prevent loss or damage to exhibits in Exhibition Halls, but in no case will the Skowhegan State Fair assume responsibility for any loss or damage that might occur.

Due to insurance Regulations, there will be no vehicle traffic or parking allowed in the agricultural area or midway area from 11:00 am to 11:00 pm from August 8th - 17th. All violators will be towed at owners expense. This rule will be strictly enforced. There will be a special parking area for agricultural exhibitors.

Class 1: Grange Exhibits

GENERAL RULES:

Setup of Grange Exhibits will take place on Monday, August 5th and Tuesday, August 6th from 10:00 am to 6:00 pm.

Exhibits shall not be removed from the hall until Sunday, August 18th, 2023 from 8:00 am to 11:00 am.

All Rules and Regulations as found on page 7 will also apply to all classes and categories.

All articles to be raised, grown or manufactured by the members of the Grange to whom they belong, within the past twelve (12) months.

Exhibits entered in this class are not eligible to compete as a whole or part of any other exhibit.

Passes:

Each Grange will be eligible to receive 2 season (10 day) passes for their display, No exceptions.

Judging:

Judging will take place on Wednesday, August 7th. We are using the Lt. Blue Judging Sheet. Please view back of judging sheet for a detailed explanation of state score sheets.

Exhibits are judged on overall appearance, use of theme, bible and flag display and labeling. Each exhibit must contain the items listed in the judging guidelines for the category entered in. Items placed on floor will count as part of your booth and will be judged. Exhibits will be judged by Fair judges, not State Grange Judges.

Premiums:

To any exhibiting Grange not placing in the first five places, a gratuity of \$50.00 will be paid. One Honorable mention in each category will receive a \$50.00 premium.

Granges may enter in both categories or one of the two. Each exhibit category will be displayed and judged separately, with premiums awarded in each category.

Ganges entering in both categories will be in a 10'x7' booth, with a divider to separate domestic & agricultural exhibits.

Themes, Flags & Bible:

You will only need one flag set, one bible and one sign. Flags, Bible and sign must be centered in booth, above divider.

<u>OR</u>

You may also use two sets of flags, Bible and signs if desired, in each category, placed within each side of the booth.

ALL Bible display's will be judged for each exhibit - See Judging Sheet.

One theme may be utilized for the entire exhibit or you may use a separate theme for each category.

Exhibits should be simple but artistic, telling a single story correctly and completely at a glance. Pictures, paintings, drawing and signs help. If desired, a few plants, bales of hay or flowers may be used to add to the general attractiveness of the exhibit. Do not fill bottles with milk. Instead, use flour or corn starch to simulate milk.

24 - HELPFUL HINTS & SUGGESTIONS FROM THE MAINE STATE GRANGE:

1. Ave a planning meeting to se, to work schedule, source of materials, being sure everyone knows his/her responsibilities.

2. Use a simple theme.

3. Make sure that exact display size is known and use the available space wisely. Do not clutter the display area or have too much unused space.

4. When planning, consider how color will be used. Use not more than three complementary colors in backgrounds, signs, etc.

5. Make detailed plans so there is a good balance in the display. It is recommended to exhibit like items together.

Class 1: Grange Exhibits

6. Plywood makes an excellent sturdy background. It can be reused if stored properly/

7. Plan your exhibit for the benefit of nonmembers. Plan so a spectator who knows little or nothing about the grange will stop and look, and leave with an understanding of your exhibit theme and how it relates to the grange.

8. Consider having everyone bring what you need for the display to a meeting, at which time best examples are selected for use.

9. For displays using agricultural and garden products, select best available samples for exhibit. Uniformity, good coloring and fresh appearance are important. Use things relative to theme.

10. When fresh items (fruits, flowers, vegetables) are displayed, use appropriate uniform container/plates. Replace fresh items as often as necessary to keep a fresh, crisp lock in the display all tis ne will be viewing the display, keep it fresh. Do not use fresh dairy products - use substitute items.

11. Keep Exhibit areas tidy at all times. Have it checked regularly and often when display area is open to the public.

12. All lettering (signs, posters, etc) should have a professional look. It may mean paying someone to make signs, posters, do lettering, etc., but consider that an investment for the Grange since the items may be used again if stored carefully. Labeling should be uniform and readable from in the front of the booth.

13. Make sure that any mechanical parts and lights are always working. Check thoroughly prior to installation and often during display time.

14. When designing displays that use unusual and/or antique items, be sure that they will be safe.

15. When parts are used more than one year (such as risers or backgrounds), be

sure that they are cleaned and repainted if necessary prior to placement in the exhibit.

16. If exhibit rules permit, see that Grange name, number and location are visible.

17. Consider planning an exhibit that can be used in whole or in part at other times and places. Examples: at a mall, in a store window, at a library, during Grange Month.

18. If using Grange literature, have the very latest available. Display small quantities at a time, replenishing often, rather than having an untidy area. Write the National Grange Store for brochures at 1616 H St. NW, Washington, DC 20006 or call them at 1-888-4-Grange. You may also look for information on their website: <u>www.nationalgrange.org.</u> Allow a few weeks for delivery. You may also contact the Maine State Grange office at 207-623-3421 for availability of additional information.

19. If appropriate, have an exhibit area manned at all times, but especially when crowds will be in attendance.

20. If possible and permitted, have something to give out as a gift to persons stopping at your display. It should have Grange identification on it. There are companies that sell such items in quantity at a fairly reasonable cost. Consider this a promotional investment in Grange.

21. Allow plenty of time for assembling the display. Putting the exhibit up usually takes longer than anticipated.

22. Plans from the beginning should include the taking down of exhibit and cleaning up the area.

23. If there are reusable parts, see that the Grange knows where they are stored. (A list given to the Grange Secretary as part of the committee's report at a meeting is one way to keep track of things.)

24. Have a committee meeting after the display to Assess the results.

HOW TO SELECT AND PREPARE YOUR PRODUCE FOR AN AWARD WINNING EXHIBIT

Judging Standards:

- Excellent: Clean, free from any damage, uniform in size, true to variety.
- Good: Free from damage (no more than 5% loss of total weight), relatively uniform in size, fairly true to variety.
- Worthy: Fairly clean, free from serious damage (no more than 10% loss of total weight), fairly uniform in size.
- No Award: Dirty, Seriously damaged, overmature, extremely different in size, shape or color.

Tips:

- Trim Correctly: Cut off tops of all root crops about 1 inch above roots
- Quantity: Check Categories for proper quantity.
- Wash or Brush: Harvest only clean vegetables or wash with soft brush or cloth.
- Type: Specimens must represent type of variety.
- Size: Specimens should be uniform in size. Oversize are often coarse, while under-size often lack of typical color.
- Roots: Stems and roots should be either "all off" or "all on".

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR DOMESTIC ANIMALS AND

POULTRY.

ALL LIVESTOCK MUST HAVE A RABIES CERTIFICATE

\$5.00 Stalling Fee per head for ALL stalled animals.

Horses:

(Equine Infections Anemia) All horses or other equidae imported into the State of Maine must show evidence of being tested and found negative to the Coggins test within six months of entry. All horses from within the state must have a negative Coggins test done within 36 months.

Cattle:

Permit required for all cattle imported into the State of Maine. All breeding bovines imported into the State of Maine must be tested within 30 days prior to date of entry for both Tuberculosis and Brucellosis (except official vaccinates under 18 months of age). No Brucellosis or Tuberculin test is required for cattle in the state if they originate directly from herds within the state, not under quarantine. Tuberculosis test required on steers and oxen imported into the state. Each exhibitor of livestock will assume full responsibility for compliance with all Maine State Health requirements. All animals must have a RFID tag.

Each farm will be allowed 5 entrants daily per farm of 10-12 head. Entrants may enter 10-12 head of cattle, additional cattle will be allowed upon approval. Please provide number of cattle and list of names allowed for daily entry on entry form provided.

Poultry:

All poultry shall originate from flocks that have an official pullorum-typhoid clean rating.

Quarantine:

No domestic animals or poultry originating from herds or flocks under quarantine shall be permitted on the fairgrounds. Domestic animals and poultry offered for show or exhibition and at any fair, livestock or poultry show and/or exhibition, showing evidence of external parasites, foot rot, shipping fever or other disease, may be excluded from

and ordered removed from such fair, livestock or poultry show and/or exhibition. Otherwise situations will be handles as the director of said division of animal industry may direct. All domestic animals and poultry originating outside the State of Maine must meet the same requirements to show as are required for entry into the state.

Warts: Warts will be classified as an infectious disease, with the exception of 4-H club slaughter steers with warts may show at fairs at which they are sold immediately for slaughter, providing they are stabled in an area satisfactory to the Commissioner or his agent, and that no other cattle shall be house in this area until it has been cleaned and disinfected.

GENERAL INFORMATION

All sheep & goats **MUST HAVE Scrapie Tags** - Any sheep or goat without a tag will be removed from the grounds.

Transportation of Cattle & Sheep:

In order to avoid congestion on Monday, August 12th, open show cattle and sheep must be in place by 12:00 pm (noon) Sunday, August 11th, but not before Saturday. Once stalled, animals cannot be replaced. We advise you to come late Saturday night and Sunday to avoid the

Cattle in Barns 1 & 2 will be released on **Saturday, August 17th at 11:00 am.**

All Sheep will be released on Saturday, August 17th at 2:00 pm.

Manure:

Due to the new facilities, all manure must be removed by wheelbarrow.

Parking/Camping:

Off site parking available - stall fees waived for exhibitors taking advantage of this offer.

After being unloaded, Trucks, Trailers & Vans must be parked in the parking lot provided for this purpose.

Livestock exhibitor cattle trucks or trailers must park across the road.

All Camper's, Tents or Live-in Trailers must pay a \$100.00 fee for a camping space with reservation. Fee may NOT be deducted from premiums, please send payment with application. Use **Camping application** form. All campground rules apply. Send your camping form and payment along with your entry.

Trailers with living quarters or Campers must be equipped with self-contained toilets to meet the state and municipal health laws and regulations. No gray water will be allowed to run on the ground.

Electricity:

There is to be no cooking, hot plates, refrigerators or any other electrical appliances in the stalls or pens. There will be no tampering with any electrical outlets, fuse boxes or other apparatus. No more than a 200 watt bulb shall be used in any socket.

Entries:

Entries close August 1st. All entries should be forwarded to **Garrett Lambert ~ PO Box 39 Skowhegan, ME 04976**, no later than the above date. Family/Farm generations will be reguarded as a seperate Firm/ Farm. Members of the same firm or the same farm within 1 generation, will be regarded as one exhibitor and will be limited to 10 head of dairy cattle and/or 12 head of beef cattle. Livestock Superintendent reserves the right to refuse animals based on available space. **Include the \$5 stalling fee with entry.**

Insurance:

All Exhibitors with livestock at the Skowhegan State Fair are required to provide proof of liability insurance with a minimum of \$300,000 coverage. Send Certificate of

Insurance or copy of Maine Association of Livestock Exhibitors Membership card with your entries. Use Cream MALE Membership form.

Hay & Straw:

Hay & Straw must be furnished by the exhibitor, and will be available for sale on the grounds at a reasonable rate.

Care & Feeding:

Owners are responsible for overnight care & providing feed. All animals are to be washed on the wash stands only. **In the event of a death or loss of an animal, the owner is responsible of removing the animal from the fairgrounds IMMEDIATELY.**

Weigh-Ins:

All animals required to weigh in for events, must be weighed at the designated time on the fairgrounds using certified scales provided by the fair.

Judging:

No exhibitor shall interfere with the work of the judges. Judging will begin Wednesday morning, August 14th, at 10:00 am for Sheep, 11:00 am for Beef Cattle and continue Thursday morning, August

14th, at 10:00 am for Dairy Cattle, all shows will continue until finished. Judges are instructed to award premiums on only high class animals of good breeding and type. Inferior animals are not desired and shall receive no premiums, or only such premiums as shall be deemed worthy by the management. All decisions of the judges are final, except on appeal. Exhibitors may inquire at livestock office for order of judging.

Right of Appeal:

If for any reason an exhibitor wishes to make an appeal from the decision of a judge, he/she must present the same to the livestock superintendent in writing within 5 hours of the cause of the appeal with a fee of \$5.00, when such action will be taken by the management as deemed best. If it is found he/she had good cause said \$5.00 will be returned to the exhibitor, otherwise it will remain in the hands of the Skowhegan State Fair.

Purebred Animals:

All animals entered must be purebred and present at the time of entry, or on request of proper officials, a certificate, showing name, age, register number, sire & dam, issued by the association making such registration. No premiums will be paid on grade males in compliance with the State laws. Entries must be registered in owner's name. No distinction will be made between polled and horned males.

Sleeping Quarters:

Must be furnished by exhibitor. Due to lack of room, stalls, and pens must not be used for sleeping quarters or storage unless allotted a tack stall. **HORSE PULLERS** -- STALLS MUST BE CLEANED BEFORE YOU LEAVE OR YOU WILL FORFEIT YOUR PREMIUMS. The Management: Reserves the right to accept or reject any entry made. The premium list has the approval of the board of directors and further changes or awards will not be made without their consent. The management further reserves the right to interpret any rule or statement made in the book.

Premiums:

All animals to compete for herd or group premiums must first be entered for single premiums.

Not over two premiums will be paid to an exhibitor in any group entry; and not over one in any herd or flock entry.

An animal may enter as many classes as it is eligible to according to class and age. There may be unlimited entries in single classes, but no more than two premiums will be paid.

Ownership:

Joint ownership of breeding cattle with an animal owned in partnership which partnership has been in existence 30 days prior to the date of closing entries may be shown in the name of a part owner, but the facts of the partnership must be stated at the time of entry and the animal must appear in the same part owners name through all classes wherein entered.

Ownership of all animals must have been acquired prior to August 1st. Animals shown in any class must be the actual property of the exhibitor.

Security:

Competent security will be on the grounds 24 hours per day during the fair dates. The Skowhegan State Fair will not be responsible for any loss or damage. Every possible care will be taken to prevent loss or damage to exhibits in Exhibition Halls, but in no case will the Skowhegan State Fair as-

sume responsibility for any loss or damage that might occur.

SHOW RING CODE OF ETHICS

All animals must be shown in their own age group.

The following are not allowed:

Misrepresenting the age of an animal for the class in which it is shown.

Balancing the udder by any abnormal means, including the use of mechanical contrivance or the injection of fluids or drugs.

Setting the teats and/or occluding (sealing the ends) with a mechanical contrivance or with the use of a chemical preparation.

Treating or massaging the udder or its attachments with an irritant, counter-irritant. The use of common products such as fly spray, ointment, or liniment in excess to the extent that it is irritating is included as an irritant unless required to reduce edema at time of calving.

Treating or massaging any part of the body internally or externally with an irritant, counter-irritant or other substance to temporarily straighten a weak back or loin or to produce unnatural animation. Minimizing the effects of cramping by feeding or injecting drugs, depressants or applying packs or using artificial contrivance or therapeutic treatment except normal exercise.

Blocking the nerves to the foot to prevent limping by injection drugs.

Striking the animal to cause swelling in a depressed area.

Surgery of any kind performed to change the natural contour or appearance of the animals body, hide or hair. Not included is the removal of teats and horns, clipping and dressing of hair and trimming of hooves.

Insertion of foreign material under the skin.

Changing the color of the hair at any point, spot or area on the animals body, including the blackening of a gray spot.

The use of alcoholic beverages in the feed or administered as a drench.

Administration of a drug of any kind or prescription internally or externally prior to entering the show ring, except for treating a recognized disease or injury and for tranquilizing bulls 2 years old and over. For

the purpose of these rules, the term "drug" shall mean - any substance, the sale, possession or use of which is controlled by license under federal, state or local laws or regulations and any substance commonly used by the medical or veterinary professions which affect the circulatory, respiratory or central nervous system of a cow.

The use of any drug, stimulant, depressant, or medicine which might affect the natural performance of any team entered is forbidden. The association reserves the right to require any team entered in a drawing match to be subjected to the saliva test or any other test for the purpose of determining thereby the presence of any such drug, stimulant, sedative, depressant or medicine. The test may be taken at such time and for any reason which the Fair Officials, in their sole judgement, consider advisable. The test or tests required, will be taken by a qualified veterinarian, to be designated by the Fair Officials, and will be examined by a qualified laboratory or technician, also to be designated by the Fair Officials. Should any test taken by virtue of the foregoing regulation result in a positive finding of the presence of any drug, stimulant, depressant, sedative or medicine, the person or persons entering the team on which said positive test was taken will forfeit to the Fair all premiums won at the fair by said team, and will be subject to such other action with respect to future competition at the Fair as the Fair Officials may determine.

Criticizing or interfering with the judges or other exhibitors while in the show ring or other conduct detrimental to the breed or show.

Children under the age of 9 will not be allowed in show rings, with the exception of Youth show rings.



Driver will be disqualified if he/she delays contest. Puller is expected to have tractor running and be prepared to hook when drag returns to starting point.

A driver must remain seated during pull and must have at least one hand on the steering wheel ar all times.

Weight transfer sled will be used with a twelve inch hitch height.

- PULLING RULES -(AMENDED MAR 2018)

1. All pulls will have even weight classes of either 1000 or 500 lb. increments, depending on time allowed. An 8000# and 8500# class was added March 2019.

2. If there are less than two tractors in a weight class the class will be cancelled. The member may elect to pull in the next higher class.

3. All pullers must produce a current MATC and EDGE&TA membership card.

4. Tractors pulling in Maine Antique Tractor Club Pulls will meet the following conditions: a. Tractors must have been manufactured in 1960 or before, with the exception of tractors whose model # series began in 1960 and before may be pulled with a cutoff year of 1965, even if the series continues. All other rules governing the use of tractors still apply. Examples: Farmall 140, 240, 340, 460, 560 Cockshutt 540, 550, 560 Oliver 550, 660, 770, 880, 1800 John Deere 730, 830, 1010, 2010, 4010 Ford 541, 641, 741, 841, 941 Case 430, 530, 630, 730, 830

b. Tractors will be "stock" which includes stock engine, frames, transmissions, rearend and axle housings or a manufacturer's replacement. Stock engine means the correct O.E.M. block offered with that model and year tractor. No engine can exceed the recommended horsepower or rpm by more than ten percent (10%) and in no case shall exceed one hundred (100) horsepower. All tractors will have a working governor. Only a single exhaust will be allowed unless it is a standard manufacturer's option

c. All tractors must be equipped with working brakes.

d. All tractors must have a kill switch or a device accessible from the operator's seat to kill the engine (ignition switch).

e. Fuel: Gasoline, diesel, kerosene or LP fuels only. No alcohol or nitrous fuels may be used in tractor. Tractors manufactured to use diesel fuel only cannot be converted to gasoline or LP. No airplane fuel is to be used. Fuel is meant to be the same fuel that you use in your automobile or truck.

f. All tractors will have a working PTO. Any tractor without a PTO must have been shipped without a PTO and must have the factory cast cover in place and have no sign of having had shifting linkage for PTO operation.

g. Drawbar: The drawbar and drawbar support must be in excellent condition. Drawbars must be solidly attached to rear-end housing having a cross support bar. Drawbars have a maximum height of twenty inches (20"). This distance is the distance from a flat surface to the highest point on the drawbar including any shims or washers, or to a point where the hook meets the clevis if that point is higher than the drawbar. Tractor operators must

equip their tractors with a clevis that is pinned vertically through the drawbar. Clevis pin must be at least 18" out from the center of axle line. Measurement is taken from axles centerline to the back edge of pinning point.

Tractor operator may use a modified drawbar with a 3" minimum inside diameter opening for direct attachment of the drag hook. Measurement requirements will be the same as for the use of a pinned clevis.

The chain must remain in a straight line from point of attachment at drawbar to point of attachment at sled.

5. Three-point hitch drawbars may be used only if support struts and anti-sway bars are used. No vertical or horizontal movement is allowed by any O.E.M. hitch or pulling point. Operator may in no way be able to move the hitch from the seat of the tractor. Drawbar must be solidly bolted or pinned in place. All other types of twopoint hitches must follow the above rules, and have been recommended for use by manufacturer

6. No altered (cut), dual, or radial tires may be used. Also, no track, chains or steel wheels, except at special events. Tire size limited to a width of 18.4.

7. The only weights allowed are O.EM., cast, bolt on wheel weight, suitcase and weight brackets and/or prior approved by Pulling Committee. No railroad iron, concrete or curling dumbbell weights. All weights must meet the following requirements before pulling:

Wheel weights & suitcase weights may be any brand, not necessarily the same brand as the tractor. All hanging weights must be factory appearing weights, no wheel weights hanging off the front. All ready rod and bolt ends will be covered for protection. All wheel weights must be tightly secured to wheel with no movement. No bungee cords or elastic or rubber cords are allowed when securing hanging weights. Ratchet straps or chain straps are

allowed if they are secured tightly. Front hanging weights are not to extend more than 3ft. from the front of the tractor frame. IF anything falls off of the tractor during pull, the tractor is disqualified. You will be allowed to add weight for the nearest even class, then a maximum of one thousand (1000) pounds from this point. The maximum width of the tractor is to be no more than 4 ft. from the center of the tractor to the outside of the weights or tires. <u>Date & Time:</u> Starting at 10:00 am Sunday August 11th

8. Tractors will be weighed with the operator that is to pull that tractor. If the tractor is to be pulled again with another operator, it must be weighed again. LIMIT - any tractor can pull "only" twice during an event, excluding the Open Class. The Pulling Committee may change this rule at an event if too few tractors are available for a full event. See Number 18 below. A youth under the age of 18 years old, who has taken the MATC Safety Course and passed on all tractors they operate can pull the same tractor only once, can pull only once per weight class, and can pull a maximum of four times per tractor pull event on a different tractor even if that same tractor has or will be pulled twice by an adult.

9. Tractors may be weighed as many times as necessary to obtain your desired weight class. Remember that tractors pulling before you have priority, especially when pulling has started.

No member may load or unload weights on, or near scales, so as to interfere with the weighing of tractors. No parts may be removed from a tractor other than cast weights to get into a class. It is the discretion of the committee members present to weigh tractors before the pull or just weigh the first three places at the end of the class. Whoever is unsure of their weight may still weigh their tractor at the beginning of the pull. Tractor and driver may not exceed 1% over their weight class. No weights may be added or changed after a tractor has entered the pulling ring.

10. Speeds: Tractor speed may not exceed 3.5 miles per hour.

Speeds: 1st or 2nd gear, not to exceed 3.5 MPH.

Torque shifting is not allowed. If the speed is broken, the driver stops at the first sound of the horn and backs up, re-hitch and pull over staying within the stated speed. If you speed a second time, you get the distance

at the horn with no disqualification.

11. If the first puller in any class achieves a full pull, the drag may be reset, weight added, and that member may elect to pull again or move to last and pull again.

12. Tractor pullers must put the tractor in neutral and have both hands raised before being hooked to the drag. If you back into the drag you will be disqualified.

13. A tachometer may be used to check O.E.M. RPM at the discretion of the committee. PTO RPM are not to exceed 700 RPM. If stock RPM are over 700 you must have proof by means of an owner's manual, etc. Engine RPM are not to exceed 10% of O.E.M. rated RPM. Tractor horsepower may not exceed 10% of O.E.M. rated horsepower and in no case more than one hundred (100) horsepower.

14. (OPTIONAL) 25 Ft Rule - This is the committee member's choice and will be announced at the beginning of pulls when using a weight transfer sled. If a member starts the sled in either the wrong gear or too high a gear or has an engine problem and stops before the sideline markers at 25 feet, the drag will be reset and member may pull again. A member may use this rule one time per class. In the event of an engine problem, the member may pull last at the discretion of official. If any part of the drag crosses the 25-foot line and the member stops, the distance will be measured and recorded as the distance pulled. If boundaries are to be set up at a pull, they will be white sidelines. If any part of the tractors tires touches the white line you will be stopped and the distance measured. If your tire crosses the white lines you will be disgualified.

15. No four-wheel drives in regular classes. Special classes can be set up for antique four-wheel drives only.

16. All members will conduct themselves in an orderly fashion at all times.

<u>Date & Time:</u> Starting at 10:00 am Sunday August 11th

17. No tractor operator may stand while pulling the tractor.

18. Open Class – In order for a tractor to enter the Open Class, it must weigh at least 7000 lbs., including weights and driver. The only exception will be if there are not enough tractors to make a class (2), and then it will be by invitation only by the Pulling Committee.

19. There will be no step-on sleds allowed at any time.

20. Only one person is allowed on a tractor at any time. Drivers must remain seated at all times except for tractor which are designed for standing; i.e., steam tractors and certain gas, kerosene tractors which are allowed no more than two operators.

21. Spectators must be kept at least thirty (30) feet from the edge of the track. Spectators may be closer if a solid barrier or a fence separated the spectators from the track.

22. No tractor shall be left unattended with the engine running.

23. There will be no hot-Rodding in the pits (staging area) or track area.

24. The front of the pulling tractor is not to lift more than sixteen (16) inches (wheels off the ground). A chain device will be provided by the MATC.

25. Wheelie bars are recommended but not required. If wheelie bars are used, they must be checked to ensure that they will not allow the front of the tractor to lift more than sixteen (16) inches off the ground and must be tested to weight of tractor. If wheelie bars are used, the chain device is not needed.

SAFETY

The track flagman rules while the tractor is on the pulling track.

Each sled will have a certified working fire extinguisher mounted in such a manner as

to be easily available to the sled operator or ground personnel in case of a tractor fire.

No alcohol is to be consumed or served at any Maine Antique Tractor Club event – when tractors are involved.

STONE BOAT PULLS

Mandatory Requirements

1. The "Stone Boat" sled must be built with safety in mind to protect the puller, the sled operator and the public.

2. EDGE&TA recommends that a ¾" alloy steel grade 80 chain and hooks which have a working load limit of 28,300 lbs. be used on stone boat sleds.

3. The branch safety advisor shall review the pulling chains, hooks and bolts.

4. The branch safety advisor must be satisfied that it meets all EDGE&TA requirements.

5. All weights must be built so they can be easily handled safely.

6. Tractors not to exceed one hundred (100) horsepower.

7. Chain must be tight before the pull is started.

8. Puller must not jerk the chain when starting a pull

9. Stone boat pulls may have classes up to and including 10,000 pounds.

10. A full pull is ten (10) feet.

11. All Stone Boat pulls will be conducted using a (14') fourteen foot pulling lane. This lane to be marked on the pulling track under the direction of the pulling committee. The operator of any tractor that touches or crosses the lane marking line, while pulling, will be disqualified in that class.

RULES FOR SPECIAL PULLS

Six-foot (6') elimination on concrete: Concrete-pulling places will be determined by the best/furthest of the three tries, not a

totaling of the three. Measurements will be taken from a parallel point and measured to center of drag.

Ten-foot (10') elimination on dirt: Places will be determined by the best/furthest distance of the two tries, not a totaling of the two.

PROOF OF INSURANCE REQUIRED

Maine Association of Livestock Exhibitors (MALE) Insurance is **NOT** Supported.

Exercise Area:

Exercising of pulling animals will be absolutely prohibited on the fairgrounds other than in the area provided which is located in the northwest section of the grounds. In the interests of safety and cleanliness in the livestock departments, this regulation will be strictly enforced. Owners not willing to abide by rules will be asked to leave the grounds with their teams. Exhibitors who need to use their trailer or truck will have to stall their horses or oxen in a box stall barn.

Permits:

No permit may be issued unless the sponsor has adopted the following rules governing the conduct of each contest.

Starting Time:

All teamsters who are to compete in contests shall have their teams ready at the published starting time. **All classes shall be closed after the positions are drawn.** Classes shall start as nearly as possible to the published time. Teams shall remain in the rings at all times, until they are

dismissed by the superintendent.

Weighing-in:

Check weighing will be allowed prior to the official weigh-in. Official weigh-in shall start in the am and up until all positions are drawn. Any one weighing one horse/ oxen and pulling another in its place; (if this can be proven) owner shall be barred from the pulling for one year. Fair superintendents or person weighing; shall notify this association and in turn superintendents shall be notified.

Measuring:

The starting point shall be properly marked to indicate same starting point for all loads. Measuring shall be in a straight line to the nearest point of the drag. Line to line measure will be allowed. The front of the drag must touch the line before turning. To get the full line measure, drag must be turned more than one/half way or completely out over the line. Drag may not be pulled out & reset by the helpers unless they're are unable to reset between the lines or agreed upon by all teamsters. In the event os a tie on longest distance measured, the second longest distanced already pulled will take top placing. One inch or more constitutes a hitch.

Hitching & Unhitching:

Teams shall stay hooked to the drag at all times, no unhitching and re-hitching will be allowed.

Elimination:

Starting load shall be determined by the superintendent. Added loads in each class at the discretion of the judges, depending on the type of ring. At no time after weight has been decreased may it be increased.

Time Limit:

3 minutes for 2 hitches; 5 minutes for 3 hitches. 5 minutes for distance pulls, un-

less otherwise agreed upon by the teamsters. Time starts when the drag is moved. Time limit to hook on shall be 3 minutes with the exception of horses & oxen that do not go a total of 25 feet in the first minute will be asked to unhitch. Times shall be kept by the announcer or appointed time keeper. Breakdown: An actual separation, breaking or bending of equipment shall constitute a breakdown. Chains or straps not properly secured are not considered a breakdown. In the event teamster wishes credit for distance pulled before breakdown it will count as a hitch. Over the Rail: If a horse's/oxen's foot strides over the line, it will count as a hitch, with no count for the distance pulled. Teams must remain within the lines whole hitched to the drag.

Use of Reins, Whips and Goads:

Horses - The very light use of reins on the hind quarters only. Reins shall not be doubled up. No whips, brads or goads will be allowed. No over/under will be allowed. No electrical or electronic devices will be allowed. No open bridles will be allowed. **Oxen** - No whips allowed, except with head yokes. The use of a goad shall be light. Only wooden goad sticks, without brads or tape may be used. No plastic goads allowed. The goad will be 4 feet or less, blunt on both ends and no larger than 1/2 inch in diameter on small end. No weighted ends or shifting of ends will be allowed. The goad maybe use lightly on the face to control oxen but not around the eyes. No electrical or electronic devices will be allowed. Oxen must have a plain yoke, (head yoke is considered a plain yoke) with all bull rings, ropes, halters, etc. barred.

Helpers/Teamsters:

After hitch on there shall be only 2 helpers. The helpers shall stay behind the drag un-

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less need to help the teamster with snarls & turns. The helper shall not have a goad. There shall be no assistance from evener tenders other than hitching. Teamsters must stay behind horse/oxen rumps at all times when pulling. No teamsters may be changed after pulling the first load, except in an emergency. Then only when permitted by the judges with consent of the majority of other teamsters in the class. Teams are to be driven by one teamster only and there shall be no heading of horses/oxen. **Horse/oxen** - Any number of helpers will be allowed to help hitch.

General:

All participants shall be properly dressed. Proper language must be used at all times. Any participant under the influence shall be disqualified from the contest. Tests may be made to determine intoxication. The drinking of intoxicating beverages in or around the ring is prohibited. No one under the age of 9 allowed in pulling ring.

Use of Drugs:

Use of drugs or stimulants on any competing animal is prohibited. The fair or person conducting the contest reserves the right to test any animal. The owner and teamster found to have used a drug on any competing animal shall be barred from pulling for 2 years, as required by sections 74-A chapter 226.

Horses:

At the finish of the pull, only the top half may enter the next class. One blanket outside of harness is permissible.

Oxen:

No bulls allowed to pull.

Barriers:

A substantial barrier shall be maintained at

Condition of Animals:

Any animal which is thin or dehydrated or is lame or show open sores, the directors or superintendent shall make the decision if the animal shall be allowed to pull.

Insurance:

Before a team is allowed to pull, the owner shall provide a certificate of insurance in the amount of \$300,000.00.

Judging:

No exhibitor may interfere with the judging or the decision of the judges. Any situations that may arise and are not covered by the above rules a decision shall be left to the discretion of the judges.

Management:

The management reserves the right to accept of reject any entry, to close or reopen any class, to set ahead or change program on account of weather conditions or change in track if deemed necessary for the best interest of the Fair. 



GENERAL RULES:

Please use the Intent to Exhibit Entry Form included in this book to list your entries and mail with **proof of insurance**, **W-9 form, approval form, camping application** and any **fees** to the address listed on each form.

Rules subject to change without notice

Entries are open to youth (5-18 as of December 31 of the prior year) in the State of Maine who are enrolled in 4-H and are carrying on approved 4-H projects.

Enrolled youth ages 5-8 (Cloverbuds) are encouraged to exhibit but will not be judged competitively. Cloverbud members will receive a ribbon and gratuity for displaying their work.

What's the difference between a project and an exhibit?

A 4-H project is the general category (see the list of Project Categories/Exhibit Classes) under which a 4-H member's efforts fall. 4-H'ers are expected to keep an annual Project Record for each of their projects to guide and track their progress. 4-H Project Records are based on goals each youth sets for themselves. Exhibiting in the Fair may be a goal or a step to a goal.

Fair exhibits are a way to share with the public what a club or individual has been doing in 4-H.

Each exhibit must be plainly marked with the state-printed version of the 4-H (or Cloverbud, as appropriate) Exhibit & Judging Card AND a Life Skills Wheel card. Be sure to include the age and number of years in the project on the top portion of the Exhibit & Judging Card. Life Skills Wheel cards should be carefully completed on both sides to give judges an accurate idea of the project's scope and the work involved in creating the exhibit. Exhibits must showcase the work of the member exhibiting, not an assemblage of a kit. "Kits" include the prefabrication, assembly, or collection of component parts which materially diminishes the exercise of those skills the 4-H project is designed to teach. Kits may only be included as part of a display or exhibit but cannot be the primary component of the exhibit. An example would be in a hobby or collection category: a model train with a landscape or scenery created by the member; a collection of model cars assembled by the 4-H'er. Explanations should be included by the member on the judging card to clarify any use of prefabricated components in the exhibit.

Exhibits are limited to a maximum of ten (10) exhibits per member ages 9 and up. Cloverbud exhibits are limited to the ages of the youth, i.e. a 5-year-old can have 5 exhibits. Please contact 4-H county staff if you need assistance categorizing exhibits. Exhibits may be recategorized by 4-H Staff if categorized incorrectly.

Posters may be no larger than 14"x 22" for exhibits. No baled hay or straw is permitted in the hall as part of the display or exhibit. 4-H exhibits must be completed before they enter the Hall.

Entries should be brought in Monday August 5th from 4:00 pm to 8 pm or Tuesday August 6th from 12:00 pm to 8:00 pm. Please note that all exhibit spaces need to be reserved using the intent to exhibit form provided by July 19th. All unreserved spaces will be available on a first come first serve basis. Independent exhibitors may display projects together in one space.

Hall Exhibits cannot be removed from the hall before 6:00 pm Saturday, August 17th. Exhibits may be picked up between 6:00 pm – 8:00 pm or by prearranged appointment on Monday, August 19th. Contact the

GENERAL RULES:

Setup of 4-H Exhibits will take place on Monday, August 5th from 4:00 pm to 8:00 pm and Tuesday, August 6th from 12:00 pm to 8:00 pm.

An exhibit is a representative sample of a youth's current work in 4-H. Adults may guide work and make suggestions, but not contribute materially to completed exhibits.

Club leaders will submit 4-H Club Intent to Exhibit Entry Form that certifies their club members' exhibits represent current approved projects and activities. Club leaders are responsible for ensuring that all computer-generated graphics, documentation, charts, etc. are the work of the member exhibiting, that their members' exhibits are entered in proper categories and meet minimum standards. Cloverbuds will not be judged competitively but will receive a rosette and gratuity. Judges may eliminate any exhibits that are of inferior quality.

Please use the 4-H Club Intent to Exhibit entry form to list your entries, and you must reserve a booth space by sending in the Reservation Form obtained from Somerset County Extension Office. Must be submitted by July 19th.

We use the "Danish System" to evaluate individual 4-H exhibits. This means:

Judging is based on comparison to a standard, not on comparison to others in the class.

Judges may consider skill level based on age and circumstance and expect a higher performance from older 4-H'ers, so there is some variance within the standard.

Ribbons and premiums are awarded to worthy exhibits on the basis of individual merit. **Purple Ribbon/Judges' Choice:** Superior quality, excellent work.

Blue Ribbon: Excellent quality, overall good work, may have room for refinement.

Red Ribbon: Average to above average quality. Shows signs of quality, but some areas need improvement.

White Ribbon: Below average quality. Considerable improvement needed.

101 Aerospace:

The atmosphere of the Earth and the region of space around it; the industry concerned with aircraft, missiles, satellites, and spacecraft; travel in space. Projects in this area should focus on the knowledge and research of this frontier science field. No flammable fuels.

102 Agriculture:

The science, art, and business of cultivating the soil, producing crops, and raising livestock. Projects in this area should reflect work in the history of agriculture, global agriculture, current issues such as genetically modified crops, organic designation, etc. Work should be

thorough and clearly presented through various media.

103 Aquaculture:

Rearing aquatic animals or cultivating aquatic plants for food. Projects in this area should reflect work in this area, such as raising bait, developing trout ponds, etc. and may be presented through various media.

104 Arts & Crafts:

Activities and hobbies that are related to making things with one's own hands and skills. Exhibits in this project area could reflect work in pottery or ceramics, basket making, seasonal crafts, jewelry, leather craft, candle making, decoupage, glass, stonework, or other areas.

105 Beef:

Cattle that are raised for meat. Projects in this area should focus on the production, management, genetics, or skills necessary for the production of quality beef animals. Work may be presented in a variety of media.

106 Bicycle:

Projects in this area all should have something to do with bikes; development of a bike trail, bike safety, research on effectiveness of bike helmets, rules of the road for riding bikes in traffic, uses of bicycles around the world for transportation, inventions of bike accessories, etc. and may be presented through various media.

107 <u>Cats</u>:

Projects in this area should focus on the care and ownership of this domesticated animal and may be presented through various media.

108 Child Care & Development:

Child Care is the service involving care for other people's children, development covers the biological and psychological changes that occur between birth and adulthood. Projects in this area should include strategies, tools, safety, child nutrition, and/or research covering stages of child development, etc. and may be presented through various media.

109 Clothing, Textile, & Fiber Arts:

Clothing includes coverings for the body; a textile is any kind of woven, quilted, knitted, crocheted, knotted, or tufted cloth or nonwoven fabric. Fiber arts include spinning, weaving, felting, and quilting. Exhibits should include examples of work that demonstrate different techniques and levels of difficulty for the participant and may include samples of home decor and furnishings made of cloth as well as surface decoration (tie-dye, marbling, stenciling, etc.) of textiles or clothing.

110 Communications & Public Speaking:

The activity of conveying ideas to the public/potentially large audiences. Projects in this area should cover any form of communication including journalism using either traditional or new technol-

ogy. Exhibits in this category can include written copy of any speech to convince, to deliver information, or to entertain on any appropriate topic. Work may be presented in a variety of media.

111 Composting & Recycling:

Composting is the decomposition of biodegradable organic matter; recycling is the art and/or science of processing used materials to create new products. Projects in this area should research or demonstrate either composting or recycling and may be presented in a variety of media. Exhibiting creative transformations of waste into decorative or useful items is encouraged.

112 Computer Technology:

The activity of designing, constructing and programming computers. Projects in this area should focus on knowledge of and show examples of computer hardware or programs. (See 148 for website and digital design)

113 Creativity Unlimited:

This category is for any exhibit that does not fit under another category.

No more than two exhibits may be entered in this category.

114 Dairy Cattle:

Cattle that are reared for their milk production. Projects in this area should focus on the production, management, genetics, or skills necessary for the production of quality dairy animals. Work may be presented in a variety of media.

115 Digital Art:

Computer generated, scanned, or drawn using a tablet and a mouse. Work should be framed or otherwise prepared for hanging.

116 Dog:

Projects in this area should focus on the care, ownership and skills of the owner and animal. Work may be presented in a variety of media.

117 Energy:

Any source of usable power. Projects in this area should research or demonstrate types of energy such as solar, geothermal, nuclear, hydroelectric, wind, coal, fuel oil, renewable, or research of energy efficiency, or projects dealing with electricity are expected, etc. Work may be presented in a variety of media.

118 Engines, Tractors & Field Equipment:

Apparatus for agricultural production. Projects in this area should focus on the uses, maintenance, function, or development of this equipment. Results can be presented in various media.

119 Entomology & Bees:

The study of insects. Projects in this area should focus on insects, their habitats, their body structure, groups of insect families, current issues in insect health, care and maintenance of bee equipment, etc. No live insects permitted. Exhibit examples: A display showing at least three stages of the life cycle of one insect; mounted labeled insects; one half pint of honey from a

member's beehive; a display, poster or notebook about beekeeping, social structure of bees, the beehive or how to extract honey, etc. Work may be presented in a variety of media.

120 Entrepreneurship & Economics:

The practice of business, economics, or marketing. Projects in this area should center on business opportunities or business aids the 4-H'er has developed. Photographs, descriptions of plans, products, brochures, t-shirts or web pages explaining the business or product are all welcome. Work may be presented in a variety of media.

121 Fine Arts 2D:

Original creations; all work done by the 4-H'er. Projects in this category include drawings and prints; watercolor, acrylic or oil paintings; collage. Items must be framed or otherwise prepared for hanging.

122 Fine Arts 3D:

Original creations, all work done by the 4-H'er. Projects in this category include assemblage, sculpture of wood, stone, clay, and/ or metal. Items must be prepared for display.

123 Family Life:

The members of a household under one roof including the strengths and needs of all. Exhibits in this area could include examples of family events such as game night, or methods of dealing with family stresses including births, hospice, or financial restrictions and how the family developed strategies to thrive during stress. Work may be presented in a variety of media.

124 Foods and Food Preservation:

Exhibits in this area may include samples of foods that have been prepared by the 4-H'er. Food exhibits must include a sample of 3 servings on a disposable plate inside of a clear plastic bag and write recipe on a recipe card. Items must be food safe for the judges and will be on display during hot weather. Food will be judged on taste, texture, and appearance. Food preservation exhibits should include two samples of food that have been preserved with details about processing indicated on the Life Skills wheel. Sealed containers will not be opened. Other examples of food project exhibits include a weekly menu plan developed to promote good health or for a specialty purpose-vegan, gluten-free, diabetes management, etc.

125 Forestry:

The art and science of managing forests, tree plantations, and related natural resources. Projects in this area should research or demonstrate uses, products, or critical issues in the area of natural forest resources. Work may be presented in a variety of media. Examples: One half pint of maple (or other tree) syrup that the member collected and processed or a display, poster or notebook about maple sugaring, identification and life

cycle of trees, invasive forest species, etc.

126 Gardening & Horticulture:

This area includes cultivation of plants; fruits, vegetables, flowers, and ornamentals. Projects should reflect work in gardening (either indoors or outdoors) and the production of food items, flowers, herbs, etc. Work may be presented in a variety of media. Vegetables and fruit must be displayed on a white paper plate. Produce should be displayed in the quantities listed:

1. Beans or peas—10 pods

2. Radishes or Brussels sprouts—5 each

3. Corn—3 ears

4. Beets, cucumbers, carrots, parsnips, potatoes, onions, peppers or tomatoes (green or ripe) - 3 each

5. Small fruit, including cherry tomatoes-¹/₂ pint box

6. Turnips, rutabagas, cabbage, broccoli, melon, squash or pumpkin – 1 each

7. Indoor plants must be alive and healthy.

8. Herbs may be either dried, clipped, or presented living in a pot

9. Floral arrangements and corsages may use any combination of cultivated and wildflowers to present a pleasing visual effect. No invasive or poisonous species, please.

127 Goats:

Agile animals that are raised for dairy production, fiber, meat or companionship. Projects in this area should focus on the production, management, genetics, or skills necessary for the production of quality, healthy goats. Work may be presented in a variety of media.

128 Healthy Living:

(Includes Health and First Aid) Taking responsibility by making smart health choices for today and the future. Projects in this area may include research and demonstration in a variety of areas including fitness, smoking prevention, drug free activities for teens and families, personal safety of information on the internet, etc. Examples: A first aid kit for the family, barn or vehicle; posters including photos of the 4-H'er participating in designated sport and containing information on the extent of involvement. Work may be presented in a variety of media.

129 Hobbies & Collections:

A hobby is a spare-time recreational pursuit; a collection is 4 or more things grouped together and intended to be viewed as a whole. Projects in this area should be clearly described. Work may be presented in a variety of media.

130 Home Environment:

(includes Landscape or Exterior Home Beautification, Home Improvement) Deals with the physical surroundings of the home. Projects in this area could deal with exterior decorating, weatherization, modification or repair, landscaping, housing for pets, etc. Work may be presented in a variety of media,

including photos, renderings, and maps.

131 Horse:

Projects in this area should focus on the management, genetics or skills necessary to produce or maintain quality, healthy animals. Work can be presented in a variety of media.

132 Industrial Arts and Building Trades:

Hands-on work demonstrating engineering, metalworking or carpentry; knowledge and skills needed to work with tools and machinery. Projects in this area should focus on design and skill development in the areas of industrial arts. Exhibits including samples of work, design plans, representations of demonstrations, research, etc. are welcome.

133 Leadership:

The ability to influence a group of people to move toward a common goal. Projects in this area should focus on leadership opportunities and the results of taking advantage of those opportunities. Exhibit examples include posters, scrapbooks, or other appropriate presentations of information and experience.

134 Outdoor Education, Recreation & Environmental Stewardship:

The act of going out into the natural environment, learning about, and respecting the environment; forms of recreation that take place outdoors. Projects in this area may cover a specific topic or activity and should include research, demonstration, and/or a presentation of a specific area of expertise.

135 Performing Arts:

Arts or skills that require public performance. Projects in this area could include dance, drama, music, puppetry, mime, clowning, magic, etc. Presentations should include some type of visual that can be viewed or auditory that can be listened to by the judges and public. Video and audio files may be submitted on flash drives, but each exhibit should be the only file on that flash drive. The duration of any video or audio file should be less than 10 minutes.

136 Personal Development:

To guide oneself toward improvement and achieving their own aspirations. Projects in this area could focus on an area of self-improvement including but not limited to strength training, flexibility, learning a new skill, etc. Results should be documented in a thorough way that shows this process but protects the privacy of the individual. Work may be presented in a variety of media.

137 Pets:

Projects in this area will include any animal whose main purpose is companionship and does not have another specific category. Exhibits should focus on the skills and knowledge necessary to own this animal. Work may be presented in a variety of media.

138 Photography & Video:

Act of taking and printing photos: moving pictures stored digitally for editing or playback. Exhibits in this area could include a photo album, samples of photos taken (2 for ages 9-12; 3 for ages 13 and up) or video clips taken by the 4-H'er. Video and audio files may be submitted on flash drives, but they should be the only file on that flash drive. The duration of any video or audio file should be less than 10 minutes. Photos must be framed and prepared for wall hanging or be appropriately displayed on a shelf.

139 Physical Science:

The term for the branch of natural science that studies non-living systems. Projects in this area could focus on rock formation, weather, geology, caves, etc.; may include collections of rock specimens (10 or more-if small; for heavy or large items, consider photography, etc.). Work may be presented in a variety of media.

140 Poultry:

Domesticated fowl kept primarily for meat and eggs. Projects in this area should focus on the skills and knowledge necessary to produce healthy, productive poultry. Work may be presented in a variety of mediums. Please note eggs must be clean or they will not be accepted for exhibit. There should be 6 eggs displayed in a clean carton.

141 Rabbits:

Domesticated and raised for pets, food, or fiber. Projects in this area should focus on the skills and knowledge necessary to produce healthy, productive rabbits. Work may be presented in a variety of media.

142 Safety:

Knowledge and skills to prevent injuries and accidents and how to get assistance when they occur, including but not limited to farm and rural safety, fire safety, injury and illness prevention, kitchen safety, internet and technology use, and environmental safety. Projects in this area could include family fire escape plan, toddler proofing plan, research about accident prevention, etc. Work may be presented in a variety of media.

143 Science:

This category is for projects in the fields of biological science, astronomy, chemistry, plant science, marine science or any science not covered by another category. Work may be presented in a variety of media.

144 Sheep:

Animals that are raised for fiber, meat or milk. Projects in this area should focus on the skills, knowledge, and equipment necessary to produce healthy, productive sheep. Work may be presented in a variety of media.

Class 1: 4-H Club Exhibit

145 Swine:

Also called hogs or pigs and primarily used as sources of food. Projects in this area should focus on the skills and knowledge necessary to produce healthy, productive swine. Work may be presented in a variety of media.

146 Shooting Sports:

Activities including hunting, marksmanship, archery, crossbow, and related firearms. Projects in this area may cover safety, equipment, ethics, landowner relationships, etc. and may contain a pictorial demonstration. No firearm and/or projectile equipment may be submitted by a 4-H member for exhibit in the 4-H Exhibit Hall. Work may be presented in a variety of media.

147 Technology & Engineering:

Practical application of existing scientific and engineering techniques rather than theory and design. Projects in this area could focus on bridges, buildings, inventions, power sources, transportation systems, etc. Demonstrations and handcrafted models of ideas could be presented. Work may be presented in a variety of media.

148 Veterinary Science:

The branch of medical science which deals with the study of diagnosis, treatment and prevention of diseases in companion, domestic, exotic, wildlife and production animals. Projects could include observations from a day with a vet, birthing experiences of your own animals; new techniques in veterinary science, etc. Work may be presented in a variety of media.

149 Volunteerism & Citizenship:

The willingness of people to work on behalf of others without being motivated by financial gain, learning to be an informed and active member of society. Projects in this area should document volunteer activities and show the importance of community engagement. Exhibits may include photographs, detailed records of volunteer hours, testimonials of persons or causes supported, informative collections of historic items of national or local interest, or any other appropriate media.

150 Web & Graphic Design:

Projects of creative visual expression of content delivered by display or internet. Examples include link to website, hi-resolution jpg for graphics

151 Wildlife & Fisheries:

All animals that are undomesticated; the aquatic population harvested recreationally. Projects in this area should focus on harvesting, recreation, or tourism aspects of this category. Exhibits could include articles made by the 4-H'er, such as: a collection of 6 flies including 1 dry, 1 nymph, 1 streamer and 3 other flies; tying tool block; hatband or other fishing related projects appropriate to age and skill level.

153 Working Steer:

Young male cattle trained to work with a yoke and to do heavy pulling similar to draft horses. Projects in this area should focus on the skills and knowledge necessary to train and work with steers, safety or equipment. The material may be presented in various media

201 Educational Club Exhibits:

Any club or individual member is eligible to enter an Educational Exhibit. The 4-H members must construct the exhibits. Should any exhibit be of inferior quality of form and in the opinion of the judges, unworthy of the premium offered, it will be eliminated from the judging. You must reserve a display space by sending in the Display Reservation Form.

The purpose of the 4-H Club/Individual Educational Exhibit is to show the work and goals of 4-H clubs OR educate the public. Club/ Individual exhibits should display the meaning and spirit of 4-H through examples of one or more projects (dairy, photography, gardening, etc.), and use "4-H" in the title. All 4-H and Cloverbud club exhibits must be prepared by members of the club, not parents or leaders, although adults can assist youth as partners in the process.

Club/ Individual Educational Exhibits can be up to 5' tall, up to 6' wide and 4' deep (5' x 6' x 4') and should make use of the full display area. Tables may be available by request. The display should show subjects/ projects the Club/Independent 4-H'er has been involved in over the past year.

Club and Individual members will be judged as separate categories, with two sets of ribbons (1st- 8th) and premiums offered.

Cloverbuds will not be judged competitively but will receive a rosette and gratuity for quality educational displays.

Note: 4-H members should set up their display with little help from leaders, parents, etc. Up to 20 points may be deducted off the exhibit score if this is not followed.

Club Name may be a part of the club exhibit (it will be covered during judging)...OR the club may have a poster with their club name and county neatly printed on an 8.5-inch by 11-inch sheet of poster paper or other decorative sturdy paper to be placed on the club exhibit after it has been judged. Please remember that individual youth names should not be included on the display.
